Spring ponds and spring holes

Never to be outdone by any companion, Dick Frantes, known variously as "Dri-Fli Dick", or "The Acerbic Angler", took one step too far and sank more than ankle-deep into the black gumbo of Wagon Landing Springs, which Dick obstinately named Wagon Wheel. I knew it already. It had to happen. Now, should I let him stay stuck, or should I wade gallantly to the rescue, thereby winning points to exchange for revelations of secret fishing spots? Naw. What if he should sink deeper? To have that on my conscience? The loss of a truck and driver with whom to alternate on these ridiculous excursions?

Should I go back to my car and bring out the tow rope? Would I have time? Should I throw him my wading staff? Yes. And so Frantes pushed himself back to that finger of sand that extended out from the landing path. But did he quit while he was ahead? Not on your life.

And so we continued to fish Wagon Wheel and Marquee Springs, and others dim to memory over much of a decade.

For those who want to follow in Frantes' footsteps, or maybe not, Wagon Landing Springs lies not too far north and east of Star Prairie, Wisconsin. I wish you joy of the wading, but I would recommend a belly boat to float you into deeper water where the brookies are certain to be larger.

Marquee Springs lies sough of Highway 8 in Wisconsin and west of the Apple River, which the springs feed upstream of Amery. You may leap like goats from hummock to hummock around the margin; wiser folk will find the outlet on the east and wade up into

the pond. When I was last there, the bottom at the outlet was silt over firm sand.

I do not recommend either of the springs as a destination. We usually stopped and paid our respects on the way to a hot spot or on the way back from another lost cause. You may "lay up a dime," one of Dick's favorite expressions, meaning that you have accomplished something. I have heard rumors of trout taken around Star Prairie, but you can't prove it by me. Not yet.

Dick named other nameless spring holes, ponds and streams as the mood suited him. He led me on an excursion down a dangerous, wooded slope to a tiny stream, "Toilet Seat," so named because he found one there on his first visit. Dick was also careless: I had the pleasure of removing a hook from his finger, using a true method often illustrated in notable trout books.

The man who didn't tie flies

Dry Fly Dick

I thought that with the appearance of the Dry Fly Dick Frantes Fly Tiers at the April TU meeting a little history would be in order as a lot of the newer members were either fortunate or unfortunate in not knowing "Dry Fly Dick."

Dick took over the tying program years ago—he lined up the tiers, obtained a supply of flies for door prized and more, so this is the reason his name is now on this once a year program.

Dick was real character. He and his brother, Tom, ran a plumbing business started by their father at the intersection of Annapolis and Smith in the city of West St. Paul. I always thought that this was a front for his main love, "Dick's Fine Flies and Folderol," a separate business that occupied the same location as the plumbing business.

Dick didn't tie flies, so he would try any ruse to get people to tie for him. He would trade material, hooks, equipment or even plumbing supplies because he hated to pay for flies and preferred to establish credit accounts with his tiers.

One day he came down to my house to check my stock. I was tying a lot of flies and would throw them in some red cedar boxes that my father had made for me. There were all sizes in these boxes— from twos to twenty-twos. Dick told me, "Let me take them to the shop and I'll pick out what I want. There were three hundred and fifty flies in the

boxes. In a couple of weeks, Dick brought the empty boxes back.

He had taken all three hundred and fifty flies. I sure had a big credit account.

Due to the nature of his business, Dick was not an early morning fisherman, so most of his fishing was in the afternoon and evening. After lunch he would take off in a rusty old Chev Suburban with the license plates "DRI FLY" so you would know it was him.

From early spring until late fall it was always ready for trout fishing with fly rods, reels, fly boxes waders and boots in the back.

Dick was seldom without a bottle of blackberry brandy in case he wandered into snake country. He probably fished much more than the average trout fisherman and was able to visit a lot of streams that were passed up by the average weekend fisherman.

I miss Dick. I used to stop at the plumbing shop before he retired to shoot the breeze. We would come to chapter meetings together as I haven't driven at night for some time. Dick would drive and I would buy him dinner. It was a good arrangement if you could stand the cigarette smoke. Dick was a chain smoker — the doctor had him quit for a couple of years, but he started again and that done him in.

I hope this will give some of the newer members some insight into why we have a Dry Fly Dick Frantes Fly Tiers program every April.

April 10 public hearings to consider single

DNR seeks public inp

On Monday, April 10, there will be public hearings in each Wisconsin county starting at 7:00 p.m. where residents interested in natural resources management will have an opportunity to provide their input by non-binding vote and testimony to the Department of Natural Resources, Natural Resources Board and the Conservation Congress on proposed fishing and hunting rule changes and Natural Resource Board and Conservation Congress advisory questions posed in the official questionnaire.

Individuals who have an interest in natural resource management are encouraged

to attend the hearing in their county. Individuals attending the Spring Hearings will need to register; they will be given a Spring Hearing questionnaire that contains Department of Natural Resources proposed fishing and hunting rule changes, Natural Resource Board and Conservation Congress advisory questions and a white ballot where citizens can cast their non-binding vote on advisory questions in the questionnaire.

Individuals will also be given a blue ballot to be used on resolutions introduced on the floor by other citizens. Individuals attending the hearing in the county of their residence will have the opportunity to nominate and

elect other citizens to the Conservation Congress or stand for election themselves. However, anyone may attend any meeting and give his or her opinion and vote on the questions.

The Bureau of Fisheries Management and Habitat Protection and the Bureau of Wildlife Management would like citizen input on proposed rule changes that appear in the questionnaire. In addition, the Conservation Congress seeks input on advisory questions within the questionnaire regarding various natural resource issues that have been raised by other citizens or committees within the Conservation Congress.

The results of your input on the questions are advisory to the Conservation Congress and the state Natural Resources Board, the policy making board for the State Department of Natural Resources. The Conservation Congress does not accept written comment on proposed advisory questions; should you have a concern please contact your local county delegates.

This year there is a Conservation Congress Trout study Committee question of great interest to Trout Anglers. It reads:

■ Question 72: Create a Single Standardized Statewide Trout Regulation

In 1990, trout streams were grouped into 5 categories that allowed various streams and fisheries to be managed according to their biological potential. In 2003, the regulations were eviewed and modified to reduce the category number to 4, simplify the regulations and continue to manage the streams dependant on their biological and physical capabilities.

While some anglers feel there is a need to manage trout streams on a category basis to optimize the fishery, there is concern by others that regulations are still too complicated and have driven fishers away from the sport of trout fishing. Although, not supported by scientific evidence, some individuals feel that regulations may be responsible for the drop off in youth recruitment to the trout fishing ranks.

■ Question 72: Would you support the standardization of a statewide trout regulation that would allow for a 3 bag trout limit with a 7 inch size restriction?

As you can imagine this question has proven to be divisive in certain regions of the state. At the March business meeting the membership decided not to take a formal position and risk distracting attention from the real issues, e.g., development and runoff, groundwater mining, and loss of stream access. Instead, Kiap TU Wish Chapter members were encouraged to weigh in on this issue by attending the hearing closest to them.

The March board meeting was cancelled because of the snow storm. Work schedules and other obstacles have hindered rescheduling. We're working on it!




