Project off to a "Rollicking" Start

This year's stream improvement project got off to a rollicking start when twenty volunteers showed up to cut brush and trees. With Area Fish Manager Marty Engel leading the charge with his spray can of blue paint, the workers could easily identify the things they were to cut and the piles of brush and timber mounted fast. Even though the chapter's chain saws went down early due to recoil problems, well over a hundred yards of stream bank were cleared by about 2PM. In fact, the fishworkers worked so hard and fast that most of us were beat by that time.



Two lessons were learned. First, we need more people in waders. If you have a pair, put 'em on, because the water is deep in some places and we'll need a bunch of people on the far bank next time. Second, we can always use an extra saw. It's very unusual for both of our saws to be down at once, but if your is in working order, it doesn't hurt to tug it along.


'Bow's Planted

◆ Pocket Water Casts - In the Tradition of The Acerbic Angler-

For many years a comparatively small number of enthusiastic American anglers have fished certain well-known Eastern streams with the dry fly...But at present it cannot be said that the use of the dry-fly has become at all general in America. No longer ago than the spring of 1911, one of the largest New York dealers in fishing tackle- one of the few who have carried a stock of floating flies for a number of years- told the author that in his opinion there were not more than one hundred real dry-fly fishermen in the United States. During the past year, however, interest in this method of angling has been increasing rapidly... it has been almost totally neglected by American angling writers, and has been lightly tossed aside by many anglers as an English fad. *Emlyn Gill, Practical Dry-fly Fishing, New York, 1912*.
