

The "Afton Angler" to share trout, pike, steelhead, secrets at February meeting

In a Figment and Fragment called "Wilderness Walleyes" published earlier in Rip-Rap, I mentioned a sortie into Lake Nipigon Obongo wh

to demonstrate the proclivities of paid guides to take us from pillar to post to prove they are earning their price.

I am a fisher for trout, but I have not disdained the pursuit of other fish. Our party on Nipigon pushed north from our primitive dock on Nipigon, past Shakespeare Island to the mouth of the Wabinosh River, but that was not far enough away from civilization. We toiled up the Wabinosh River into Wabinosh Lake. I will not complain over the carry of gasoline motors around a stretch of rapids, although I remember thinking that we were crazy; all that for a few mythical northern pike.

In due time but not in good order we reached the lake and launched our boats, screwed on the seven-and-one-half horsepower outboards and proceeded with the Tom Sperry method. You will not believe this: well, maybe you will since I swear to the truth.

We attached KB spoons, large ones, to a 40 pound test line attached to a heavy-duty cane pole. We revved the engines to threequarters power, which was pretty fast, and pushed out into the lake. The northerns hit those top-bouncing spoons like NASCAR drivers; we threw the poles overboard, then circled to pick up the poles and land our monsters. I am ashamed to say how many dead fish were brought back in triumph to line up on the grass of George's lawn in Madison, Wisconsin, but those were years before Catch-and-Release. At least portaged north of Wabinosh Lake into Lake Obongo where the northerns were reputed to be even larger and swifter. Isn't that a wonderful name for a wilderness lake? It's like something out of the heart of darkness in Africa. No wildebeest, but plenty of black flies.


Kiap TU Wish is kicking off it's drift boat raffle. This is a drift boat hand built by a small meticulous crew of chapter members who dedicated many, many hours of their time and expertise in bringing this boat to reality.


The purpose of the raffle is to raise funds for a stream rehab project in 2007 on Pine Creek near Maiden Rock, Wisconsin. There are a number of partners in this project and money is needed. Ojibleau and Twin Cities chapters have agreed to help sell tickets, also.

What we need is for members to step up and buy and or sell tickets. Think about friends or contacts you have in Wyoming, Montana, Idaho, Michigan, Missouri, Arkansas... who may want an opportunity to win a drift boat while contributing to an outstanding Trout Unlimited stream project. This raffle has a great potential for raising funds for the Pine Creek project and





showing the drift boat crew how our members can get behind them and make this a major fund raising event. Step up and help make this Kiap TU Wish effort a major winner. What we have here is a beautiful 14 foot Greg Tatman boat. The hull is spruce plywood. The solid wood components are oak, mahogany and Port Orford cedar. The boatbuilders worked hard to create a good looking, durable boat, treating all the wood with a mixture of boiled linseed oil and mineral spirits to stabilize and preserve it.

Solid wood components received at least three coats of urethane spar varnish, while plywood pieces were primed with an oil base primer and treated to multiple coats of Tatman-recommened oil base enamel.

The exterior of the boat is Evergreen and the interior is Slate Gray. The exterior bottom is coated with two coats of Kevlar-reinforced epoxy manufactured by TAP Plastics. The boat was constructed with SPAX brand fasteners and has UHMW plastic oarlock bushings, a UHMW anchor "bang plate", a 30lb. pyramidal anchor, a Bo's anchor system, bronze oarlocks and GULL brand oars.


At the January meeting, I carried on about a crayfish imitation that I'd been using for smallmouth bass fishing. It incorporates elements of a traditional woolly bugger, a Whitlock Near-Nuff Crayfish and a

Holschlag Hackle Fly. Despite the lengthy instructions, it's an easy and straightforward fly to tie. Because it's keel weighted with a copper barbell and lead wire, it rides hook up

Berner Chawdaddy I A Chawdaddy Bugger J

Instructions

Mount the hook (A) in the vise and start the thread two eyes spaces behind the hook eye. Built a small thread bump and seat the barbell (B) against it. Secure the barbell with figure eight wraps, finishing just be-



in the water. The weight gets it down in the water column quickly and helps impart a nice jigging action to the fly. The instructions call out the materials for an olive-colored fly, but shades of brown/tan or dirty orange work, too.

Crawdaddy Bugger

Recipe

- Hook: Tiemco 5263, size 4 typical
- Thread: Dark 6/0 Uni Thread
- Weight: Copper barbell, small, and .035" lead wire
- Tail: Eight strands black crystal flash, two strands green fleck sili-legs, two strands brown round rubber legs, two clumps olive blood marabou.
- Body: Olive Antron chenille, medium
- Hackle: Brown saddle hackle

lead with thread wraps, finishing at near the hook bend. Tie in eight strands of Krystal Flash (D) the same length as the hook shank. Tie in two strands of sili-legs (E) about ¼ inch longer than the Krystal Flash. Tie in two strands of round rubber legs (F) 1/2 inch longer than the Krystal Flash. Tie in two clumps of blood marabou feathers (G) slightly shorter than the Krystal Flash. Tie in a brown saddle hackle feather (H) by its butt end. Tie in a length of chenille (I), leaving approximately a two inch tag facing forward. Advance the thread 1/3rd the length of the hook shank. Wind the tag end of the chenille around the hook three times, tie it off and trim it. Advance the thread to the hook eye. Wind the standing length of the chenille over the entire length of the shank (This will produce a tapered body), tie it off and trim it. Wind the saddle hackle forward to the hook eye using 5 turns. Tie it in and trim away the excess. Build a thread head, whip finish and cement.

I'm challenging all of you to participate in the First Annual : 1st Annual D.F. Flote Fishing Story Contest.


There is only one rule: Keep you entry clean enough that your mother could read it!!
