Members Urged to Help Push For New Regulations I hope that by now all of you have received and taken action on the packet of letters the chapter mailed on January 21st. I believe that new fishing regulations based on proven scientific principles are critical to improving the quality of the cold water fishery in western Wisconsin. So if you haven't taken action on the letters, please do so soon.

The letters were composed and mailed in a very short time and were not fully detailed. We assumed that everyone is fully aware of the most recent proposal put forth for the Lower Kinni. It provides for a slot limit protecting fish from 12 to 18 inches long, and it allows a daily bag limit of three fish with only one over 18 inches. It also allows the use of natural bait. It is not a radical proposal by any means.

Also, the letter addressed to the various officials mentions only the Kinni. Please note that the chapter supports the DNR's proposals for ALL of Pierce County, including Category 4 for the Rush and Trimbelle rivers. If you would like to state your opinions in a letter of your own, please do so. Members of the Conservation Congress in this area are also interested in hearing from you. 

Chapter Urges Willow Falls Dam Removal

The Willow Falls dam and its future are a matter of

intense interest in our area. The DNR has proposed removing the dam and performing extensive mitigation work. The chapter's board supports this.



Removing the dam may create a new stretch of trout stream and it may help bring colder water to the Willow and Race below the Willow Falls dam.

The DNR is responsible for many dams statewide, and the action taken on the Willow Falls dam may help set a precedent favoring flowing water over impoundments (continued on back page)

FLY-FISHING EXHIBIT NOW AT BELL MUSEUM

Beginning February 1st and running through June, the Bell Museum of Natural History on the University of Minnesota campus will be the home of a traveling exhibit from the American Museum of Fly Fishing in Manchester, Vermont.

Gawk at the fishing tackle used by famous anglers from Ernest Hemingway to Bing Crosby! Gape at antique fly tackle dating back from Victorian times! Hobnob with angling celebrities from all over the country!

Rod building, fly tying, and net making will also be featured in workshops on February 4th.

All this is happening in conjunction with a new conservation group known as River Heritage. On March 17th and 18th the group will sponsor a symposium at Bell Museum titled "Rivers, Fish and The Angler"

The symposium "will feature nationally-known figures in a discussion on the policies and philosophies of river fisheries management. The goal of the symposium is to inform Minnesotans and stimulate their respect for Minnesota's rivers and fisheries."

A number of other Fly-Fishing related activities will be taking place in conjunction with this exhibit and symposium, and we'll keep you informed.


9:00 a.m. and continue to


3:00 p.m. Work dates include January 28, Feb. 11th and 25th, and March 11th and 25th.

Here are directions to the project area:

Take I-94 east to highway 63. Go north on 63; three miles past county road G take a left and proceed one and a half miles to the work site.

If you're coming from the north, take highway 64 to county road T. Go south on T for two miles, take a left, go one mile, take another left, and proceed one mile to the work site.






SOUTH FORK IS STREAM IMPROVEMENT TARGET

Fishworks '89, a joint project between the Willow River Rod and Gun Club and Kiap-TU-Wish, will commence this January on the South Fork of the Willow River east of New Richmond. The project will begin on January 28th and continue every other Saturday through March.

Designed primarily as a brushing project and directed by area fish manager Marty Engel, the project area will move downstream from the '87 project and will attempt to stabilize the banks and get more sunlight into the stream while at the same time preserving in-stream trout cover.

There are some log jams that need removal and some

box elder that will have to be felled, but the bulk of this project is brush removal. As such, this is relatively light, fast work and even children can get involved.



You'll need hot coffee, warm clothes and gloves, a hand saw, large loppers or a <u>small</u> chain saw. Lunch will be provided by the chapter and maps and greater details

Marty Engel has also mentioned the possibility of another project on the Kinni, but no firm plans have been made as of yet. -Mike Alwin



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Kiap-TU-Wish Offers News & Notes Renewal Enticements


