#### FISHWORKS '91


Every year Kiap-TU-Wish leads the charge into the woods on our annual winter project. The goal of FISHWORKS '91 is to finish the headwaters project design by Area Fish Manager Marty Engel for last year's project. Marty's idea is to cut enough brush and trees to allow plenty of sunlight on the banks. This will encourage the growth of bank stabilizing grasses.

FISHWORKS '91 is a timbering and brush cutting operation. Dress accordingly - warm clothes, hat, gloves - and bring a strong back and hot coffee. You'll also need to pack a lunch and if you have a bow saw, heavy rope, waders or hip boots, come-along or chain saw, bring those too. Work dates are January 12 & 26, February 9 & 23, March 9 & 23. We start at 9AM and work until 3PM. The Kiap-TU-Wish Rule of 20 is in effect. If, on our work date, WCCO radio reports an air temp or windchill of -20 on their 8AM weather report, we don't go out.

This sounds pretty serious, but it's actually a lot of fun and the fish need our help. So, here's a map and some directions. You can sign up at the January 2nd meeting or call Gary Horvath on 715/425-8489 or Mike Alwin at 612/439-8159.

Take I-94 to the WI65 exit. Drive north on WI65 about 1/4 mile and turn right. Drive south less than a mile. Park north of the bridge. The worksite is to the east, upstream from the bridge.

In addition, we've planned two other one day projects which we hope to do simultaneously. One is in-stream tree removal on the Race and the other is a rebrushing on the Kinni.





#### NOTES FROM THE PRESIDENT:

By now, all of you should have received a letter regarding the Spittler Quadrate Willow River Rod. I hope you will avail yourself of this opportunity. The possibility of acquiring this fine piece through a very minimal investment is quite good and the funds generated from this project will be well directed. A few people have asked me to what address they ought to send their ticket. Please mail it to the chapter address: P.O. Box 483, Hudson, WI 54016.

At a Board meeting held January 19, board members discussed the possibility of expanding the size of the board from its current six to nine. Under this proposal, six seats would be reserved for Wisconsin residents, while non-residents would be eligible to fill three seats. Currently the arrangement calls for four Wisconsin residents, so the ratio would remain the same. Frankly, this is a very cohesive chapter and I feel that the residency requirements are the least important aspect to consider in this matter. There are good questions to be asked on both sides of this issue, among them these:

- 1. Is a six person board sufficient representation in an organization of 140 people?
- 2. Should we change a system that has served us well?
- 3. Are good, qualified people locked out of the board because of its size, and, conversely, if we expand its size, will candidates step forward to fill the new positions?

This is a critically important issue and we need your input. Feel free to contact me, but, better yet, come to the February meeting and voice your opinion so that we can determine if there is sufficient interest among our members to warrant making the proposed changes, or some modification of the proposal an item on the agenda of the annual business meeting in March.

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
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#### Major News Flash:
