Jon Jacobs: Jon Jacobs is our Chapter's most sesquipedalian member (and the only guy that DOESN'T have to look that word up!) He has served the chapter for sixteen years, as a board member, chapter vice president, and president and is now our sagacious newsletter editor.

RF annexes property along river corridor, Kinnickinnic imperiled.

At a Tuesday, December 17 meeting, the River Falls city council overrode Mayor Eric Amundsen's previous veto of a city council action authorizing annexation of a 236 acre parcel north of the city along Quarry Road for the purpose of allowing developer Hans Hagen to build a subdivision of at least 500 homes (some sources suggest it may be closer to 600). Plans to extend city sanitary and stormwater service are in place. Construction of the homes is slated to stretch over a ten year period and is scheduled to begin in late 2003 or the spring of 2004. There is considerable local opposition to the annexation and to the development and the threat of court challenges to both does exist. However, in quotes in area newspapers, Mr. Hagen has expressed confidence that the plan will overcome any legal challenges.

Kiap-TU-Wish has followed this matter closely for some time. At one point the chapter, while not in favor of development, felt that it was inevitable and that annexation to the city would provide some protection to the river. Also, the Hagen development, as originally planned, seemed to be environmentally friendly. However, the chapter's final position in a paper that was to be presented to the city council said, in part:

The Kiap-TU-Wish Chapter of Trout Unlimited believes that the "Kinni Vision " should consist of four key elements:

- Protecting the groundwater supplies that sustain the river and provide a water source for all watershed residents
- Protecting the natural flow regime, water quality and aquatic residents of the river
- Protecting Within a river corridor, the natural habitat and scenic beauty of the riverway
- Providing an opportunity for the public (residents and visitors) to enjoy the river

Growth is a permanent process that irreversibly changes the landscape and can create irreversible impacts on our natural resources, unless that growth is carefully crafted in a manner that best protects these resources. We believe that any City or township plans for growth, especially along the important river corridor, should not be implemented until all the elements of "Kinni Vision" are addressed in a sustainable fashion.

It is our chapter's position that the City of River Falls plan for anexation, as reflected in the current development proposal by Hans Hagen, does not adequately support a "Kinni Vision." The Hans Hagen site plan has changes significantly during the past year, and has become much less river-friendly.

This is an absolutely crucial issue, the importance of which cannot be overstated. Look for further reports in upcoming issues of RipRap and for additional discussions of the matter at chapter meetings.



How's your vision?

The chapter's board of directors has crafted a statement regarding a "Kinni Vision" (see article on page 3), as they call it, that lays out a series of requirements for protection of the Kinnickinnic as it faces the pressures of development. That's one kind of vision. Now I'd like you to close your eyes and visualize in your mind what the Kinnickinnic River Valley is going to look like in ten years if the Hagen development and others of its ilk go forward. Think about six hundred homes perched on less than a half-section of land. Now think about how many halfsections in the river's corndor might become available for sale at a sufficiently high price. Now multiply that figure by six hundred. How ugly is your vision? The Hagen development is, to roll out a couple of discordant clichés, the tip of the iceberg or the camel's nose under the tent. If you value the beauty, the recreational value and the trout fishery of the Kinnickinnic, be prepared to go to battle on its behalf or the nightmarish vision you just created in your mind will become a relentlessly brutal reality.
