


South Fork Project Nearly Complete

A crowd of 29 workers showed up on the picturesque banks of the South Fork of the Willow River for the first day of Fishworks 89. The volunteers cut and hauled brush, pulled out log jams and cut down trees--all the while taking care to preserve in-stream cover. This work is taking place under the supervision of Marty Engel, our area fisheries manager.

Thirteen die-hards reported for duty two weeks later on Feb. 11 for the second day of this project. They cleared out several piles of debris, a couple of brush-covered banks, and a massive beaver cache.
