Notes From Jon Jacobs

FLOODWATER DAMAGES WESTERN WISC. STREAMS

Thanks to Mark Kubler for his presentation last month, which included dramatic video footage of the incredible high water episodes that the Willow and Race experienced in late March.

This situation was common throughout western Wisconsin. The snow pack melted suddenly in unseasonably warm temperatures and flowed rapidly over the frozen soil.

There were reports that the high water mark on the Rush at Martell was barely under the new bridge deck. A bridge also washed out on the upper Kinni and the lower river shows evidence of heavy scouring and gravel deposition.

All this is part of the long-term cycle on the river, but the short term effect is difficult to categorize: On one hand we have many areas that were becoming clogged with sand and silt and are now clean gravel. But on the other hand, we have loss of plant and invertebrate life and bank destabilization.

On the Willow and Race

system, there is now a new gravel bar at the bifurcation that seems to be altering the flow distribution between the two rivers. (The DNR will be effecting repairs immediately).

There is also a possibility that the DNR will plant some rainbows to compensate for the loss of fish that must have resulted from all this. So be prepared to be conscripted to a stocking crew!

May is our last meeting of this season. I want to thank Bob Smith's Sports Club for generously allowing us the use of their facility. Have a good summer, proselytize on behalf of Trout Unlimited while astream, and be prepared to furnish details of your summer at the September meeting.

Jean Mitchell would like to remind chapter members not to throw away potential auction items during the rush of spring cleaning.



Clip and Save! The Most Important Kinni Hatches

As a farewell present to our readers (this is, after all, the last RIP-RAP of the spring), we've put together a list of some of the most reliable and productive Kinni hatches you're going to run into this summer. We also have some suggestions for matching each hatch; so all you need to do is carry this with you and you can't go wrong this season,

Late April, Early May
-Paraleptophlebia: A reddish
brown nymph or dry fly is a
good bet for this hatch.


May through September
-Beaetis: No. 16 olive nymph,
or blue wing olive dry fly.
-Caddis: No. 10-20

Late May through June
-Ephemerella: Widely known
as the "sulfur hatch," a No.
16 parachute-style dry with
olive body and yellowish
wings and tail is a good
choice.

Late June through day -Hexagenia: Try a large wulff or a light cahill.

July-September
-Tricorythodes: No. 20-24.
-Pseudocloeon
(sporadically):
Blue-winged olive.
-Centroptilum: A No. 20
yellowish mayfly.
