

elcome back! Once again summer seems to be slipping away. In my mind this cool summer felt like a long spring without the benefits of spring rains. Most of our trout waters are low and many of the warm water rivers are very low. The cool weather has been a blessing given the lack of rain.



PARKER CREEK PROJECT

Chapter volunteers were very busy on the Parker Creek project this summer. The Tuesday work nights were only cancelled once because of heat when the heat index hit 100+ plus degrees, very unusual this summer. The DNR and volunteers worked from the crossing at County J downstream to Pleasant Avenue, about one mile of stream. We averaged 12 volunteers per night. Approximately 40 structures were built and placed, many box elders were removed; a lot of seeding and mulching of stream banks had to be done by hand because of the meanders and some steep hill sides. Randy's renovated mulcher continued to work without a hitch. The project finished right under the June 30th deadline. Thank you to the very steady crew of volunteers who showed up and worked at Parker Creek last winter and through the spring and summer.

PINE CREEK

The DNR moved to Pine Creek in early July. Volunteer work began on Tuesday, August 4th and will continue on Tuesday afternoons until the project is finished. Fairmount Minerals volunteers were in full force and provided substantial help at the first work day. Directions to Pine Creek project: WI 35 to County A just south of Maiden Rock; follow County A east to the work site and parking. Volunteers usually start work around 4 PM; bring boots, gloves and water. Keep an eye on the weather and web site for updates and changes.

AN ANT FOR ALL SEASONS

f rising trout won't take an imitation of the insects that are emerging, try this trick: Tie on a black ant pattern that is smaller than the insects that the trout are eating. Cast upstream and fish the ant on a dead drift. Trout that reject exact imitations will often take small ant patterns, even during late winter

and early spring when no real ants can be found. The trick of using a fly that's smaller than the natural works with other patterns too.

When matching a hatch with a dry fly it's usually better to use a size smaller than you think you should. Why? First, we overestimate the size of insects in the air. Second, the hackle of a dry fly makes it look larger than a natural with the same length body and wing.


